
National election results





Presidential election







Current legislative schedule

- November 19-22 broad set of bills that can be considered
- December 11-13 narrower set of eligible legislation



Hurricane Helene relief and recovery



First two state relief bills

- Establishment of Hurricane Helene Disaster Recovery Fund
- Matching funds for FEMA support
- \$50 million in loans for small businesses
- Establishment (but no funding for) grant program for local governments and nonprofits with damages



First two state relief bills

- \$10 million for child care support
- \$1 million for rental assistance
- \$3 million for child welfare support and \$1.4 million for support for vulnerable adults
- Support for affected private colleges and universities



Third state relief bills

- Coming next week
- Reportedly including more funding that the first two bills
- Grants vs. loans for small businesses and nonprofits?



Unemployment – 1-minute overview

- Options for nonprofits
 - Pay state unemployment tax (SUTA) based on experience rating
 - Self-insure instead of paying SUTA must reimburse UI
 Trust Fund for UI claims of nonprofit's employees
 - Exempt from SUTA churches, religious nonprofits, and 501(c)(3)s with fewer than four employees no UI benefits



Unemployment and Hurricane Helene

- SUTA 12 weeks with maximum weekly benefits of \$600 per week (normally \$600 per week)
 - \$250 per week in additional temporary benefits through March 1,
 2025
 - Benefits NOT charged to the accounts of nonprofits that pay SUTA or reimburse through March 1, 2025
 - No benefits for employees of nonprofits exempt from SUTA
 - Waiver or work search requirements through March 1, 2025



Unemployment and Hurricane Helene

- Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA)
 - Federal program in area of disaster declaration
 - Coverage starts after SUTA ends for employees of covered employers at same weekly benefit rate as SUTA
 - Coverage starts immediately for employees of non-covered employers with benefits of \$152 per week



Legislative support for nonprofits

- Nonprofit recovery fund
- Including nonprofits in business grants and regulatory relief
- Incentives for charitable giving
- Sales tax exemption
- Seeking input from nonprofits







Other state policy priorities in 2024

- Veto overrides
- Constitutional amendments?
 - Photo ID for absentee voting
 - Lowering income tax cap
 - Removing literacy test from voting requirements
- Child care funding
- Other hard-to-pass legislation



Fair Labor Standards Act and the 2024 Overtime Rule



Fair Labor Standards Act

- Minimum wage
- Overtime pay for non-exempt employees
- Equal pay for equal work



Fair Labor Standards Act

- Exemptions for executive, professional, and administrative staff
 - 1. Paid on salary basis
 - 2. Must be paid at least the minimum salary threshold currently \$844/week or more (\$43,888 per year)
 - 3. Must meet duties test







DOL regulations - recent history





2024 final overtime rule

Salary threshold - July 1, 2024

\$684/week (\$35,568 per year)



\$844/week (\$43,888 per year)



2024 final overtime rule

Salary threshold - January 1, 2025

\$844/week (\$43,888 per year)



\$1,128/week (\$58,656 per year)



2024 final overtime rule

Updating salary threshold

Every three years, starting July 1, 2027
